Reminder From Bay Area Barns & Trails.

EVACUATION CHECKLIST (From EquestriSafe – Before Emergencies Happen)

Truck and Trailer (in working order).

Animal carriers/cages for all pets.

Equine first Aid Kit

Flashlights/batteries/shovel/bandana

Halter and lead rope, (for all equines)

Identification and stall cards for all equines (Horse ID Collar, Fetlock ID bands)

List of host properties or Evacuation Centers

Secondary contact information (relatives and friends out-of-the area, veterinarian, etc.

Three to five days of feed per animal

Three to five days of any medications/supplements

Vaccinations and Proof of Ownership.

ICE PRODUCTS: SAFETY-FOCUSED EQUINE & CANINE GEAR. It is easy to attach ManeStay to the mane or tail. FROM HALTER - HORSE AND LIVESTOCK TEAM EMERGENCY RESPONSE:

ANIMAL IDENTIFICATION: Reunification of animals and people is often a big challenge for owners and agencies after evacuation. Make sure your animals have identification! Here are several ways to ID equines and livestock that are SAFE in fire situations. If your animal is not microchipped, try to use more than one type of ID. 1. MICROCHIPPING: Safest. Best. Most Foolproof. 2. I.C.E. ManeStay Tags if you have them. These are fast & easy to attach to mane. Have the ID info filled out ahead; stash the tags in your barn ready-kit 3. Write on hooves: use

fat black marker or white chalk marker to write phone number on all hooves 4. Spray-paint phone number or a symbol on both sides of your animal. For example: big slash mark, or, big letters. When describing your animals, you can say "Bay gelding with left sock and orange "XO" on both sides. You get the idea! if you're planning ahead, get Special livestock marking paint- it has a skinny nozzle for writing, so you don't spray your entire mule hot pink; - Livestock crayons (grease markers) are good, too. Warm them up a bit so they're easier to use. 5. A big splash or stripe is good in a rush. You can describe "sorrel gelding with pink stripe on rump." 6. Braid a cattle tag into mane, with your name & phone number. Keep tags, markers, and braiding runnerbsnds in a Ziplocbag. 7. Take photos of animal: face and all markings. Include yourself in the photo, if possible. If you have time, write a clear sign with YOUR NAME & CONTACTS, Animal ID info to hold in the photo.

EVACUATION REMINDERS: ID your PROPERTY ENTRANCE! Use spray paint, rocks, metal signs- anything that won't burn or wash away. Don't forget to add OUT OF AREA CONTACTS to your emergency numbers. If animals do not load in trailers, please do not request evacuation help. This puts everyone in danger, including animals! Instead, leave in best conditions possible: Lots of water, as far as possible from flammable materials like shavings, hay, empty shavings and and/or grain bags, wood. If you have to leave your animals: call the emergency number for your local animal services agency. Provide clear location details and situation information. Ask for a "Welfare Check".

LETTERS REQUESTED: East Bay Regional Park District has created a Draft Land Use Plan Amendment for Sibley Volcanic Regional Preserve, (near Orinda at the Caldecott Tunnel.) According to the plan, there will be a new camping area in the McCosker Ranch section of the park, which will be connected by new trails to both Huckleberry and Sibley. The new West Hills area of the park, near Orinda, will be open with new trails and horse trailer parking. This plan will connect trails of the East Bay with the Bay Area Ridge Trail and further connections reaching from Chabot in Hayward, to Tilden Park in Berkeley. The plan is likely to go to the EBRPD Board for approval in September and the board is accepting public comments until August 20. At present the plan has no equestrian parking slated for the new McCosker Ranch section of the park, despite it being a logical place for equestrian parking. Logical because historically, the property was known for many years as a ranch, and because it is immediately adjacent to the Moraga Horsemen's Association, which is located just down the road in Moraga.
